WikiTree www.wikitree.com

A free 'world family tree' site, controlled by the users. One of the most important features is that you, the profile manager, set the level of privacy, so you can totally control who sees the information you post. Sign is as guest, search for ancestors by name, add your family tree (can use gedcom download). There is also a system of Categories (somewhat like key words) so you can assign a category, and also see a list of all other names in the database that use that category. Families can work together and share information. You must include sources when you enter information. Can sign up to get weekly notices of family names or locations you are researching.

Find a Grave huge collection of public cemeteries and photographs of headstones; search by cemetery or name in Canada and USA; few "Indian Cemeteries"; check protocol before adding any information or photographs
